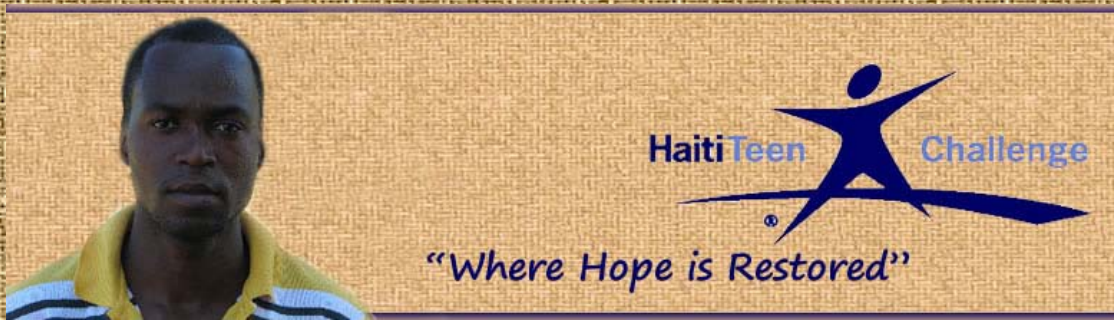


Haiti update March 20, 2010



Haiti Teen Challenge Assessment

The Board of Directors for Haiti Teen Challenge would like to personally thank everyone who supported the victims of the recent devastating earthquake in Haiti through your contributions to World Wide Village. Representatives of that ministry have spent countless hours organizing relief efforts and personally coordinating those efforts on the ground in Haiti. Please visit World Wide Village's website (www.worldwidevillage.org) to learn more about how they have been responding to the many needs of the Haitian people with food and water and the establishment of a 50-bed hospital with two surgical suites.

The following is an update of the devastation resulting from this horrific event which occurred on January 12, 2010:

- Over 215,000 men, women and children have died.
- Over 1 million residents are homeless and/or displaced.
- Most government offices have been destroyed or rendered uninhabitable, records have been destroyed or are missing, and leadership is virtually non-existent.
- There is an estimated \$14 billion worth of destruction.
- Two million loads of rubble must be removed before rebuilding can begin.
- With the annual rainy season beginning and the hurricane season close behind, many Haitians are living in open areas with nothing more than a bed sheet over their heads to protect them from the elements.

Haiti Teen Challenge's Assessment of the Situation

We have been listening, watching and learning about what has happened in Haiti and what is taking place in the aftermath of the earthquake. Most importantly, we have been praying for the people of Haiti. On March 28th our Board Chair, Craig Sulentic, will be traveling to Port-au-Prince to personally determine the following:

- 1) Does the Delmas "75-2" property that was previously considered as a residence for the HTC residents and staff still exist? Is the building still structurally sound and suitable for occupancy? If so, will the lease payments be affordable?
- 2) Are some of the potential vocational partners still in operation? (Centre Pillotte, The Diesel Institute of Haiti and Ferro Metals)
- 3) Are the tuition costs still affordable?
- 4) Is there an opportunity for HTC to work with the Mayor of Delmas and his office?
- 5) Thousands of prisoners escaped from detention at the time of the earthquake. How will their presence within the general Haitian population impact the HTC ministry?

Craig will also be visiting some of the spiritual partners and potential staff members that we met in Port-au-Prince last August. The timing for the beginning of HTC's "on-the-ground" ministry has obviously been adversely impacted by the earthquake; however there are several very important issues that have not changed, such as:

- **HTC's mission to raise up godly leaders in Haiti;**
- **Our unwavering commitment to the people of Haiti;**
- **The undeniable recognition for competent and spirit-fed leadership in Haiti; and**
- **Our continuing commitment to our donors to be good steward of your support.**

Even though Haiti has been the center of the world's attention for the past several weeks, everybody realizes that the rebuilding of that country will literally require years. Haiti needs trained leaders that have integrity and hearts filled with the Holy Spirit for their people. We are committed to using our skills, talents and God-given gifts to help bring this to fruition.
